

Halloween's Origins and the Myths that Follow

Every year on October 31st, children and adults go around from door to door asking for sweet treats. This tradition is called Halloween. The subject that no one ever questions, is where did Halloween come from and what myths follow this scary season.

About 2,000 years ago, a group of people called the Celtic (KEL-tik) or the Celts (KELTS), were Indo-European people who lived in Europe and Anatolia celebrated a tradition. This was the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced sow-in). At this festival, the Celtic people lit fires and dressed in costumes. The purpose of this was to scare off ghosts. Eventually, this tradition carried on to become a holiday in the 9th century called Hallows Eve now referred to as Halloween. But what myths follow this holiday that makes it so scary?

A very common myth that you may know is the Headless Horseman. If you're familiar with this myth, then you may be surprised if I were to tell you that it's about a German soldier. The myth goes back to 1776, during the Battle of The White Plains, in the time frame of the Revolutionary war. A German soldier, due to cannon fire, was decapitated (a little gruesome) around the Halloween season. He was buried in the town of Sleepy Hollow where every year it is said that he rises from the dead, wearing a pumpkin on his head, and riding a black horse. He returns to avenge his death and reclaim his lost head. This story brings up one very scary element of Halloween which is that the dead are never really dead but will haunt the living forever.

Another story that adds to the concept of Halloween is "The Salem Witch Trials of 1692". This story, which is true, started with a man named Reverend Samuel Parris of Salem Village. His daughter and niece were terribly ill and he called in a doctor when their sickness started getting worse. The result of the doctor's analysis was that these girls were cursed by a witch. This started the year of 1692 where men and women were being accused of witchcraft. Many men and women who were so-called "witches" died. They were hung to death or left in prison to die. That same year, the witch trials did end but, the concept of witches never left, and now are included into the story of Halloween.

This short article brings up Halloween's concepts and ideas which come from everywhere. We can look at myths that have been created and the time periods in the past to find bits of Halloween culture. One thing we can conclude is that Halloween is a complex holiday with many scary details.



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Cinnamon Apple Crisp

What is apple crisp?

Typically, crisps have a thick layer of fresh fruit on the bottom and a crumble topping made of butter. Apple crisp, unlike apple pie, has no crust, allowing the apple flavor to be the main attraction, mingled with a little hint of buttery, oat flavor from the crisp topping.

Apple crisp, is made with just a few ingredients. It is tasty as pie, but much easier to put together.

When you want to use up a lot of fresh or frozen fruit, crisp is one of the easiest sweets to make. There won't be many ingredients needed, most of which you likely already have. Don't worry, inexperienced bakers—we've broken down the simple procedures in the recipe. We've got you covered and you'll have crisp in a matter of hours.

Steps:

- 1. Peel and slice your apples.
- 2. Combine the fruit with all the apple layer ingredients. Place in a pan.
- 3. Combine all the topping ingredients. Sprinkle over the apples.
- 4. Bake. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F for 45 minutes.
- 5. Top with ice cream and EAT.

Ingredients:


For the apple part

6 large apples (3 granny smith, 3 sweeter variety)
1/4 cup light brown sugar
1/4 cup granulated sugar
3 tablespoons cornstarch
1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
3/4 teaspoon salt

For the crisp topping

- 3/4 cup butter, cut into cubes 1 1/3 cup old fashioned oats
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 cup light brown sugar
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon ground cinnamon
